## A New Exhibit for the Mill

Recently we have been very fortunate to acquire another fine exhibit for the mill. This is not associated directly with our mill but with our nearest neighbour, Patcham Waterhall mill. It has come courtesy of a 'Friend' who kindly contacted me to say that his sister had moved into a house in Patcham and the upper half of the front door consisted of a stained glass panel depicting a windmill, would I be interested? "Oh yes" was my immediate reply when I realised it was a beautiful representation of Patcham mill and we had the perfect place to display it within our mill.



Built in 1884/5 for Joseph Harris who had a bakers shop in Patcham village, she was the last windmill to be built in Sussex. The brick tower was built by Hubbard of Preston and Holloway & Son of Shoreham were the millwrights who fitted her out. She ceased work in 1924 and over the following years was domesticated and subsequently has had several owners, one of whom, a Mrs Christiansen, was given

permission to serve afternoon teas in the mill garden. A later owner replaced the original internal wooden ladders with a spiral staircase supposedly from St Paul's Cathedral. She also installed a swimming pool and a Chinese garden, both long since gone. On 9th December 1990 during a snowstorm, a tremendous clap of thunder was followed by a lightning strike which did a vast amount of damage to the mill including shattering the sweeps. A section of one of these was saved by Frank Gregory and is displayed beneath the glass panel.

Charles and I carefully removed the pane from the upper part of the door and between us carefully constructed a frame which displays it perfectly in the window area directly opposite the entrance to the west barn.
