

Tilting at the paying public.....

West Blatchington Windmill has come a long way since its public debut. It is a good time to look back at the events and stories surrounding the occasion as reported in our local papers.

In its Jan 14 1977 copy, the Brighton & Hove Gazette carried a story detailing the intention to investigate the possibility of opening West Blatchington Windmill to the public.

"At the moment the millattracts visitors who must obtain permission to look round. But Hove' Chief Planning Officer, Mr Michael Ray, thinks it might be possible to find volunteers to run the mill and open it to the public.'

Old mill gets new lease of life

Restoration then began, co-ordinated by Keith Wood, Hove's Assistant Planning Officer, who was quoted as saying in the same newspaper,

"It is planned to open its doors to the public as a showpiece of early Victorian engineering and architecture.

This article also mentioned the Hove Fire Brigade being on standby to manually move the sweeps for the first time in nearly 80 years.

However,

"At the slightest touch the mechanism sweetly turned over after all those years."

Flour power gets 'em milling about

Exactly 18 months since the first article, on July 14 1979, a large crowd gathered to see the doors officially opened by Hove's Mayor, Councillor John McNaughton. The Evening Argus reported the expense as nearly £4000, along with 'valuable help from boy and girl volunteers'.

attracts about 2,300 visitors a year." West Blatchington windmill, built in 1824, is one of Sussex's oldest mills and has some unique features. It is six sided and is situated on top of a barn rather than on its own pole. It also has an attachment that can work farming machinery.



They also added that,

"retired teacher Frank Gregory and chemist Peter Hill, both mill experts,dressed up in yokel gear and waved from the sails to more than 100 enthusiasts...below".
